CHORAL UNION EXCURSION TO CHICAGO,

JUNE 19th to 24th, 1893.

In order to secure the lowest possible rates of transportation to and from Chicago, i. e. \$5.00 the round trip, it is necessary to form a party of not less than 200 persons. The Choral Union will probably offer the cheapest opportunity to visit the Exposition.

In regard to Hotel accommodations in Chicago the Choral Union Committee has made arrangements with two different parties and is therefore able to offer important advantages to all persons who may desire to visit the World's Fair *at any time* during the summer.

1st. In the "Hotel Thomas" on Midway Plaisance the rates will be \$2.00 per person per day in rooms, or \$1.00 per day for the use of a cot in a portion of the basement specially fitted up for the purpose. The great advantage of this Hotel is its nearness to the main entrance, being about one-quarter of a mile from the same.

2d. In the "Winchell's-Headquarters," situated on Indiana Avenue near 50th Street, the rates will be \$7.00 for five, six, or seven days and \$1.00 for each additional day per person. For less than five days, \$1.50 per day for each person. Children under twelve years of age, sleeping on a cot, half price.

These rates will continue until a certain number of engagements have been made, when they will be increased to correspond with current rates in other houses.

Remember that it is already very difficult to find good rooms within walking distance of the grounds, and that visitors should secure their rooms at the earliest possible day.

ADVANTAGES OF THE "WINCHELL'S HEADQUARTERS." - 1. About twenty minutes' walk from the main entrance. 2. A restaurant in the same building. 3. A bath-room for every seven or eight rooms. 4. Laundry in the house. 5. Four ways to ride to the grounds. 6. Special busses running twice a day to and from the grounds. 7. House built of stone and brick, already finished and furnished.
