ALWIN NIKOLAIS DANCE THEATRE

ALWIN NIKOLAIS' unique contribution to dance is the continuous, multimedia, abstract theatre work he has evolved. For some twenty years he has been an innovative force, in mixing media to create a total theatre, and the result is drama that engages the sensory experiences of the spectator. Nikolais' theatre is one of dynamics, where dramatic meaning is found in form. He builds drama through molding abstractions of sound, time, shape, color, light, and motion. The choreography is non-linear in structure, so that instead of telling a narrative, the dance work makes a poetically direct, sentient communication. Instead of asking for literal explanation, the dance images invoke a reaction of associative interpretation, quite personal but perhaps freshly perceptive.

Nikolais was born in Southington, Connecticut, and in early years was an expert pianist-organist and puppeteer. As a teenager he chanced to see a performance by Mary Wigman, the German modern dance pioneer, and her art turned Nikolais to the career he has pursued ever since—first as a dancer, then as a choreographer. He studied and worked with every major figure in American modern dance until 1948, when he began teaching and developing his unique contemporary style at the Henry Street Playhouse.

Nikolais' ideas became more than a creative basis for his own work, they became a new philosophy and technique for dance. The Nikolais technique is now one of the major techniques taught in universities and colleges in the United States, as well as in many foreign countries. Mr. Nikolais is recognized as one of the world's foremost dance philosophers, theorists, and teachers, as well as a unique choreographer and theatrician.

In collaboration with the University Dance Program of the Department of Physical Education, this program is part of a three-day residency project, receiving support from the National Endowment for the Arts and the Michigan Council for the Arts.
