About the Artist

Kenneth Gilbert received his musical education in Montreal and Paris, made his debut in London in 1968, and for the past decade has been heard in major musical centers of the world. He has performed with the orchestras of Chicago, Toronto, Montreal, the Academy of St. Martin in the Fields, I Solisti Veneti, and the Philomusica Orchestra of London, which he conducted from the keyboard. In chamber music concerts he has performed with Alfred Deller, Jean-Pierre Rampal, Julius Baker, Michel Debost, and others. Mr. Gilbert has over forty recordings distributed throughout the world, with special mention given to the Six French Suites of Bach, Eight "Great" Suites of Handel, and the complete works of Couperin and Rameau.

The artist is internationally renowned as a teacher of his instrument. He holds master classes each year at the Summer Academy for Organists in Haarlem (since 1972 succeeding Gustav Leonhardt at his invitation), and also in the cities of Antwerp, Venice, and Lurs, France. His numerous editions of harpsichord music have received universal acclaim and are used widely in music schools the world over.

The Canadian Music Council, at its meeting in August 1978, elected Kenneth Gilbert to receive its distinguished "Artist of the Year" award as "a Canadian performer who has particularly distinguished himself during the preceding year . . . an artist of international repute in demand throughout the world, a guest professor at the most important institutions, a researcher responsible for the prestigious editions of Couperin, Rameau, Scarlatti, and Bach, as well as the extraordinary recording artist of the complete works of Rameau for which he is also awarded one of the Canadian Music Council's Grand Prix du Disque."

In addition to this evening's recital, his first in Ann Arbor under Musical Society auspices, Mr. Gilbert is holding master classes at the University School of Music.
