PROGRAM NOTES

"The Calif's Goose," an Operetta Mozart

The pet of the Calif of Bagdad, a goose who had saved the Calif's life, disappears. Zelmire, guardian of the pet, appeals to her love, Murad, to help her. He, in turn, asks the palace inspector, Firuzzibaha, to assist him. The wicked Firuzzibaha, hoping to anger the Calif against Murad, suggests declaring the goose dead and then presenting it to the Calif, but in reality intends to put some old kindlings into the basket.

The star-reader, Mesreddin, has another plan. He proposes to call the magician, Mustapha, to perform before the Calif. This would provide an opportunity for Murad, with the help of assistants, to smuggle a live goose into the palace to substitute for the vanished one.

However, there is an error in plans and the live goose reaches Firuzzibaha and the basket of kindlings goes to Murad and his friends. Suspicious, Firuzzibaha orders the arrest of Murad and his helpers. However, his efforts are to no avail. The magician, Mustapha, had again changed the baskets thus causing Firuzzibaha to be found cheating the Calif.

Firuzzibaha is punished. The Calif rewards his faithful servant, Murad, by giving him Zelmire as his wife.

Die Nacht (The Night) Franz Schubert

"How beautiful you are, friendly, calm, heavenly quiet . . ."

Clear stars look down from distant heavens. Soft ground in the spring filled with moss and flowers.

Die Rose stand im Tau ROBERT SCHUMANN

The rose covered with dew like grey pearls changes to rubies with the sun's rays.

Bandlterzett (Ribbon Trio) W. A. Mozart

"Dear little husband, where is my ribbon?"

This song was inspired by a humorous incident in Mozart's life and he wrote the trio in Viennese dialect. Mozart had bought his wife, Constanze, a ribbon which he wished her to wear for a short trip. Not able to find it, they both began to search for it more and more excitedly. An intimate friend, Gottfried Von Jacquin, found it and teased them with it while their dog, Pimperl, joined in the fun. Jacquin finally gave the ribbon back and suggested to Mozart that the theme would make a humorous terzett.

Tritsch-Tratsch Polka (Gossip) Johann Strauss

"How are you?—haven't seen you for a long time . . . Not bad: . . . Life goes on!"

A nonsense polka about people meeting in the streets, gossiping, rushing, being busy. But the clock finally stops for each as time goes on endlessly.

Kaiserwalzer (Emperor Waltz) Johann Strauss

"When Vienna awakes in the spring, listening to birds singing in the woods, be ready, dear girl, for this is the time for love."

A glorification of Vienna. Boys and girls, old and young, meet in the spring, dance, love, kiss, go hand in hand. Violins play, hearts sing! This is our Vienna, pearl full of beauty until eternity.
