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Qual farfalletta amante D. SCARLATTI (1684–1757) Like any foolish moth I fly toward the flame of beauty, My joy, my only duty, at her dear feet to lie. Yet for the danger what care I? I love those eyes that lure me, 'Tis they alone can cure me, or bid me sweetly die.
Amarilli, mia bella GUILIO CACCINI (1558–1594) Amarilli, my fair one Oh, thou my heart's desire, Hear and believe me, I do love thee sincerely. Come to my arms 'Tis thee I worship, only thee. Let not doubt there assail thee Deep in my bosom, writ in my heart These words shall be Amarilli, Amarilli, I adore thee.
Der Hölle Rache, from <i>The Magic Flute</i> . W. A. Mozart (1756–1791) This story of fantasy and mystery, which Mr. Kriebel, the critic, suggests should be regarded as somewhat in the same category as a Christmas pantomime, appealed strongly to Mozart's imagination and called forth some of his most sublime music. This aria is sung by the Queen of Night who has instructed her daughter, Pamina, to kill Sarastro, the possessor of the "sevenfold shield of the sun."

Lo, here the gentle lark, weary of rest, From his moist cabinet mounts up on high And wakes the morning, from whose silver breast The sun ariseth in true majesty.
Bravura Variations (flute obbligato) A. Adam (1758–1848) Theme attributed to Mozart.
Der Hirt auf dem Felsen (flute obbligato) FRANZ SCHUBERT (1797–1828) When I sit on the highest crag and sing— My voice comes back to me
So much louder, so much fuller. My loved one lives so far from here, That's why I long for her. I feel sad and lonely, but will sing Till all hearts join with me. Spring is here and now I go to her!

Men are faithless, selfish, and cruel, but the enchantment of love is well worth the anguish. In love, men and women deceive, and are deceived—and so it is with all lovers of history and legend.
