SYNOPSIS

As the curtain opens, Violetta Valery is giving a brilliant party to celebrate her return to society after a mild tubercular attack. It is here that she meets Alfredo Germont, young son of a wealthy provincial merchant, who professes his love for her. At first coquetish and indifferent, she is finally moved by his ardor and finds herself torn between his devotion and 'her way of life.'

In a luxurious country villa we discover a transformed Violetta now living with Alfredo. His sincere passion for her has led to a rejection of her empty and arid life of the past. In the midst of their happiness, Alfredo learns that Violetta is to sell her belongings to pay for the bills. As he rushes off to prevent this, Violetta is surprised alone by Giorgio Germont, Alfredo's bourgeois father, who urges her to give up Alfredo because their illicit affair threatens to ruin the marriage prospects of his daughter. Violetta agrees and leaves a note for Alfredo telling him she has returned to her old lover, the Baron Dauphol. Giorgio Germont tries in vain to consol his son when he sees this note.

At a Bal Masque given by Violetta's arch-rival, Flora Bervoix, Alfredo searches for Violetta and her lover. When she and the Baron arrive, the Baron engages Alfredo in a tense gambling duel which Alfredo wins. As the guests settle down for supper, Violetta, fearful that the Baron will challenge Alfredo to a duel, urges him to leave. Unaware that Violetta has returned to the Baron only to insure the future of Alfredo's sister, Alfredo forces Violetta to say that she loves the Baron. Then, insane with jealousy, he humiliates her in front of the guests by hurling his gambling winnings at her: "Now I have paid off my debt to you!"

The heart break of Alfredo's denunciation has destroyed Violetta's health. Deserted by all her friends but the Doctor, Violetta cherishes a letter from Germont, promising a reunion with Alfredo. When Alfredo and remorseful Germont come to tell her that all is well, it is too late. Violetta dies in Alfredo's arms.
