About the Artist

Michael Ponti's concert appearances in the major musical centers of the world—including New York, London, Tokyo, Berlin, Vienna, Rome, Prague, Sydney, and Athens—have established him as one of the important pianists of our day. Born in 1937, Mr. Ponti studied piano in Washington, D.C. from 1943 to 1955, and then in Frankfurt, Germany, from 1955 to 1961. In the early sixties he won prizes in most of the important international piano competitions including the coveted first prize in the Busoni Competition in Italy in 1964. Soon after that he made a highly successful Vienna debut with five performances of Bartók's Second Piano Concerto, and in 1972 made his New York debut to critical acclaim from both press and public. He now tours the United States annually and, in addition to his regular European concert tours, he has also performed at the Bayreuth and Lucerne festivals.

Mr. Ponti's recording activities are extensive. Since 1968 he has made over sixty records including the complete piano works of Tchaikovsky, Scriabin, and Rachmaninoff. Last season, besides the usual piano literature, he recorded songs of Charles Ives with famed baritone Dietrich Fischer-Dieskau.

Tonight's recital is Mr. Ponti's first appearance in Ann Arbor, and the third concert of the Debut Recital Series.
