### About the Orchestra

The Czech State Orchestra was originally formed as the Czech Radio Orchestra in Brno, the city of famed Czech composer, Leos Janacek, and achieved fame through its numerous radio broadcasts and frequent recordings, many of which are now collector's items. Twenty years ago the orchestra was reorganized under Janacek's colleague, Bretislav Bakala, and since then, as the Czech State Orchestra, has attained even greater eminence as one of the world's finest ensembles. It has performed with great success in Poland, the Soviet Union, Germany, Austria, Italy, Switzerland, Great Britain, and in 1973 launched its first tour of the United States in Carnegie Hall's International Festival of Visiting Orchestras. Its second United States tour begins with tonight's concert in Ann Arbor.

Jiri Waldhans was born in 1923 in Brno, where he studied conducting at the Brno Conservatory. He became Musical Director and Chief Conductor of the Czech State Orchestra in 1961, building and expanding the orchestra into the exceptional 113-member symphonic group that it is today. Mr. Waldhans is a regular participant in the international Prague Spring Festival, and is also a professor at the Brno Conservatory and at the Janacek Academy of Arts.
