CONCERTO BAROCCO

Music: JOHANN SEBASTIAN BACH Double Violin Concerto in D minor Choreography: GEORGE BALANCHINE

Première: May 29, 1940

Balanchine choreographed this neoclassic ballet for the American Ballet and it was premièred at Hunter College Theatre. It originally had decor, but is now performed without scenery and in practice clothes. "Concerto Barocco" was one of the first ballets revived by the American Ballet under its new name, New York City Ballet, on October 11, 1948, and remains one of the most popular ballets in the repertoire of several companies.

SYLVIA PAS DE DEUX

Music: LEO DELIBES

Choreography: John Clifford World Première

The Los Angeles Ballet has plans to mount the full-length "Sylvia" during its 1979–80 season in Los Angeles. As a preview, Mr. Clifford has included the Third Act Grand Pas de Deux on this tour. "Sylvia ou la Nymphe de Diane" is a classic ballet based upon a pastoral drama by Ariosta. It was choreographed by Louis Merante and premièred at the Paris Opera on June 14, 1876, with Merante dancing. There have been numerous versions of the ballet, including Frederick Ashton's for Sadlers-Wells Ballet in 1952. Balanchine choreographed the Third Act Pas de Deux for the New York City Ballet in 1951. John Clifford's will be the first full-length version presented by an American company.
