About the Artists

Since The Belgian Chamber Orchestra's reorganization as I Fiamminghi in 1977, this celebrated ensemble has been in constant demand throughout Europe. Taking the name that Renaissance Italy gave its prized Flemish court and chapel musicians, this young group represents the highest standards of the Belgian school of string playing. I Fiamminghi members possess a virtuosic level of instrumental technique, enabling them to perform works ranging from the Italian Baroque to Tchaikovsky to the masterworks of the 20th century. On this, their first tour of the United States, they are performing in Anchorage, Fairbanks, San Francisco, Denver, Chicago, New Orleans, Washington, D.C., and New York City, in addition to Ann Arbor.

Rudolf Werthen, conductor of I Fiamminghi and internationally acclaimed as a solo concert artist, was born in Belgium in 1946. He has studied at the Ghent Conservatory, Queen Elizabeth Music Chapel, the Brussels Royal Conservatory, and with eminent violinists André Gertler and Henryk Szeryng. A winner of numerous competitions, Mr. Werthen's honors include first prizes at the International Competition in Vienna, the Amsterdam Competition, and the Deru Competition. He has won praise as soloist with the London Symphony Orchestra, the Stuttgart Chamber Orchestra, and the Deutsche Solisten. He also serves as Professor of Music at both the Ghent Royal Conservatory and the Robert Schumann Institute in Düsseldorf.

Miha Pogačnik is recognized as one of the outstanding young violinists of his generation. Born in Yugoslavia in 1949, he studied in Europe with Igor Ozim, Max Rostal, and Henryk Szeryng. In 1973 he came to the United States as a Fulbright scholar to study with Joseph Gingold at Indiana University. Mr. Pogačnik has since toured throughout Europe, with a recent tour of New Zealand and Australia. The current season marks his first major United States tour. In 1981 he founded the Chartres Summer Festival in France and now serves the Festival as Artistic Advisor. This is the first time in recent history that the ancient cathedral is used for performances of music, and attracts thousands of people from over 24 countries.

In tonight's concert, Mr. Pogačnik performs on a violin made for him in 1981 by Sergio Peresson of Philadelphia.
