



has become a legend and jazz icon. In October of 2003, the Library of Congress declared Dave Brubeck a "Living Legend" to honor his creative contributions to American life. In 1999, in recognition of his ongoing contribution to jazz, he was designated a "Jazz Master" by the National Endowment for the Arts. He has also received the National Medal of the Arts. His musical contributions as both pianist and composer have been honored with a Grammy Lifetime Achievement Award. These are but a few of the honors bestowed upon this elder statesman of jazz, whose career spans six decades.

Youngest of three musical brothers, Dave Brubeck was born in Concord, California on December 6, 1920. His father was a cattle rancher and his mother a pianist and music teacher. He entered the College of the Pacific, Stockton, California, as a pre-med student with the idea of becoming a veterinarian and returning to the ranch. Working his way through school as a jazz pianist in local clubs, he decided to forsake the cattle business and changed his college major to music. In 1942 he enlisted in the Army where he served under Patton in the European Theater.

Upon his discharge in 1946, Mr. Brubeck studied composition with Darius Milhaud, who encouraged him to pursue a career in both jazz and in composition.

The Dave Brubeck Trio with Cal Tjader and Ron Crotty cut their first records in San Francisco in 1949 and won "Best Small Combo" awards in


both the Critics' and the Readers' Polls in Down Beat magazine. When the Dave Brubeck Quartet (with alto saxophonist Paul Desmond) was formed in 1951, their distinctive harmonic approach employed by Mr. Brubeck and Desmond and the Quartet's improvised contrapuntal choruses caused a stir in the jazz world. The ensemble won the first jazz poll conducted by The Pittsburgh Courier and repeatedly won top honors in the Down Beat Readers' Polls. By 1954, Dave Brubeck's popularity was such that his picture appeared on the cover of Time Magazine and his recordings were being played throughout the world. His album Time Out and hits including "Take Five" and "Blue Rondo à la Turk" went gold, a rare feat for an instrumental jazz recording.

In November 2002, the Austrian government awarded Mr. Brubeck the highest award given in the arts, the Honor Cross for Science and Art. Former recipients include Seiji Ozawa, Riccardo Muti, and Leonard Bernstein. In November 2004 he was awarded an honorary doctorate in Sacred Theology by the University of Fribourg in Switzerland. The University of the Pacific has honored him by the establishment of The Brubeck Institute dedicated to the promulgation of contemporary music of all styles, with an emphasis on jazz and improvisation.

Dave Brubeck recently celebrated his 85th birthday in December 2005 in a concert with the London Symphony Orchestra, a five-year tradition that began on his 70th birthday.

ussell Gloyd has established an incredibly diverse career as a conductor, producer, and arranger. Since 1976 he has been associated with Dave Brubeck and has conducted the many symphonic and choral appearances of the Dave Brubeck Quartet throughout the US and around the world.

As a guest conductor, Mr. Gloyd has appeared with orchestras across North America and has

conducted and recorded with some of the première choral organizations in the US. Internationally, he has conducted and recorded with symphonies in Germany, Russia, Scotland, the Netherlands, Italy, Switzerland, Brazil, South Africa, and Poland. He made his London debut with the

London Symphony Orchestra (LSO) in 1989, and has conducted the ensemble on seven other occasions. In June 2004, Mr. Gloyd was one of seven conductors participating in the 100th Anniversary concert of the LSO, which was attended by Queen Elizabeth II. In 1995 he made his debut in Vienna conducting the European première of the Brubeck Christmas cantata La Fiesta de la Posada, and returned in 2000 for the Viennese première of the Brubeck mass To Hope! A Celebration. In April 2003, he was back in Vienna conducting the European première of Dave Brubeck's Easter oratorio Beloved Son. Mr. Gloyd has made several tours with the Bach Collegium of Munich. Since 1996 he has been a regular guest conductor with the Kammerorchester Schloss Werneck throughout Germany, Switzerland, and The Netherlands. In November 2004, Mr. Gloyd conducted the Mozarteum Orchester Salzburg in performances of To Hope! in Salzburg at the Festspielhaus, and in Vienna at St. Stephan's Cathedral. In April 2005, he made his debut with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra.

Russell Gloyd has conducted the Italian/Swiss Radio Orchestra of Lugano, Switzerland, on three separate occasions, each one being televised live throughout Europe, and has live CD recordings on Telarc International, MusicMasters, and LSO Live with the London Symphony Orchestra. In May 2002, Mr. Gloyd returned to London for recordings with the London Symphony at famed Abbey Road Studios preparing a two-CD set for Telarc entitled *Classical Brubeck*. In January 2004, Naxos Records released the recording of Brubeck's *The Gates Of Justice* conducted by Mr. Gloyd.

As a producer, Russell Gloyd has been actively involved in all aspects of electronic media. In addition to working with several major record labels, he has produced soundtracks for feature films as well as television productions.

When British-born **Randy Jones** first came to the US, he received immediate critical recognition. He played with such jazz greats as Gerry Mulligan, Chet Baker, Milt Jackson, Bill Watrous, and Harry James. He was invited to join the Dave Brubeck Quartet in 1979 and has remained with Mr. Brubeck ever since.

Randy Jones started work as a drummer at the age of 16, touring Germany with an English rockand-roll group. When the opportunity came to play jazz with the Maynard Ferguson Big Band, which was then based in England, he jumped at the chance. During the six years he was with Ferguson's band, he made numerous recordings and worked with such singing stars as Cleo Laine, Tony Bennett, and Billy Eckstine.

Mr. Jones has recorded many albums with the Quartet on Telarc International, MusicMasters, and Concord Jazz labels. He has toured with the Dave Brubeck Quartet throughout the US, Cana-

da, Europe, and Japan, and has appeared with them on numerous television shows in the US, Japan, and Europe. His most recent recordings for Telarc are *Classical Brubeck*, *Park Avenue South*, and *London Flat*, *London Sharp*; and for Naxos, *The Gates of Justice*.

A native of Buffalo, New York, where he resides, **Bobby Militello** has been performing with Dave Brubeck since 1982 in both choral and symphonic settings as well as jazz concerts and festivals throughout the US, Canada, and Europe.

Mr. Militello has been featured on many Brubeck recordings and television appearances. His most recent albums with the Dave Brubeck Quartet are *The Crossing, So What's New?, The* 40th Anniversary Tour of the U.K. (most of which was recorded live at Royal Festival Hall in London in 1998), Live in the U.K. and U.S.A., Classical Brubeck (recorded with the London Symphony Orchestra), Park Avenue South, and the most recent Dave Brubeck Quartet release, London Flat, London Sharp.

His adaptability and sensitivity to all facets of music are evident in the wide spectrum of music he has performed with Mr. Brubeck, ranging from Mr. Brubeck's mass *To Hope!* to straight-ahead jazz heard on the *Late Night* and *Nightshift* CDs recorded live at the Blue Note club in New York City. Mr. Militello has appeared several times with the London Symphony Orchestra and is featured on the *LSO Live* recording from Dave Brubeck's 80th birthday concert.

The most recent member of the Dave Brubeck Quartet is bassist **Michael Moore**, an acknowledged master of his instrument, and leader of his own duo and trio that features the bass as a solo instrument. Michael Moore has brought new recognition to an instrument once primarily regarded as a timekeeper.

Born in Cincinnati, Ohio, Michael Moore's musical training began at the Cincinnati College Conservatory of Music. After joining the Woody Herman Band at the age of 20, Mr. Moore became an important player in the New York jazz scene. In the next few years he recorded and performed with the "Who's Who" of jazz. John S. Wilson of the *New York Times* described him as "one of the most consistently brilliant bassists in recent history."

Mr. Moore has recorded four albums thus far with Dave Brubeck: *Classical Brubeck*, recorded at Abbey Road Studios with the London Symphony Orchestra; *Park Avenue South*, *The Gates of Justice*, and the current Telarc release, *London Flat*, *London Sharp*.

hris Brubeck first distinguished himself as a jazz musician, performing and recording with his father, Dave Brubeck. He plays bass, trombone, piano, guitar, and sings, and, in the past few decades, has earned international acclaim as a composer, performer, and leader of his own ensembles. On stage, Mr. Brubeck's irrepressible enthusiasm is matched by his fluid command of jazz, blues, folk, funk, pop, and classical musical styles. An award-winning composer, he is clearly tuned into the pulse of contemporary music.

Chris Brubeck is an alumnus of the Interlochen Arts Academy in Interlochen, Michigan, and of the University of Michigan. Since 1970, he has recorded his original music and toured the world with his own rock, jazz, and folk groups. He served as an adjunct professor at Skid-

more College, Saratoga Springs, New York from 1998–2002. Chris Brubeck continues to enjoy working with students around the country, conducting guest lectures and student workshops, and discussing the art of composition.



### **Ben Johnson**

UMS DISTINGUISHED SERVICE AWARD RECIPIENT

UMS will present **Ben Johnson**, UMS Director of Education and Audience Development, with the UMS Distinguished Service Award at this evening's 2006 Ford Honors Program, in recognition of his loyalty, dedication, and 10 years of service to UMS and to thousands of community members who have benefited from UMS's educational events and cultural exchanges. Constantly striving to bridge connections between individuals and community organizations in southeastern Michigan, Ben has helped redefine audience development and has been nationally recognized for his contributions.

Prior to UMS, Ben worked in the areas of programming, education, marketing, and community outreach at the Ordway Music Theater, American Dance Festival, Walker Art Center, Boston Ballet, and American Repertory Theater. Through a wide variety of artistic and educational programs, community partnerships, and collaborations, he has developed a unique intercultural framework for educating and building audiences for multidisciplinary arts presenters. Committed to the development of new audiences and contemporary dialogue on the arts, he has designed extensive community-based residencies for a wide variety of culturally and artistically diverse artists and their constituencies. He has served on many local and national funding panels and has been a panelist for Arts Presenters, Chamber Music America, Dance USA, Lila Wallace, and Arts Midwest.

Ben Johnson joined the UMS staff in October 1995. For a complete overview of the UMS Education and Audience Development Program, please turn to page 24. erek Snyder has appeared as a soloist with orchestras throughout both the US and Europe. As a chamber musician he has collaborated with members of some of North

America's most exciting ensembles, including the Cavani and Cleveland String Quartets, and the Cleveland, Detroit, Montreal, and Baltimore Symphonies. Mr. Snyder is a founding member of The Phoenix Ensemble and cellist in the tango band, The Oblivion Project, which

explores the music of Astor Piazzolla. He has created numerous transcriptions and arrangements for cello ensembles, focusing primarily on the music of Dave Brubeck and Astor Piazzolla. Recently, his arrangements of the music of Graham Nash were performed by the Contemporary Youth Orchestra with the composer. His arrangements of music by Dave Brubeck can be heard on the Naxos label as performed by the Yale Cellos. Mr. Snyder runs the Cleveland Cello School and maintains www.cellocelli.com, a source for unique and custom musical arrangements.

This season marks the **Ann Arbor Symphony Orchestra**'s (A<sup>2</sup>SO) 77th year of exceptional music making that involves the Ann Arbor community, fires its imagination, and inspires the next generation of listeners. In 1941, Joseph Maddy (founder of Interlochen Music Camp) conducted this "mom and pop" orchestra of committed and talented amateur musicians. Since 1986, the A<sup>2</sup>SO has been a fully professional orchestra, first under the baton of Carl St. Clair, followed by Samuel Wong. Arie Lipsky was the unanimous choice to succeed Maestro Wong to lead this orchestra.

Maestro Lipsky's distinguished and inspired music making treats growing audiences to thrilling performances. Each carefully prepared season features time-honored classics, a variety of less-familiar works by the great masters, and a bouquet of accessible new works by modern composers including the première of a new work by an emerging U-M student composer. This year celebrated Mozart's 250th birthday with a special musical theater commission, *Mozart Comes to Ann Arbor*. The Orchestra was heard over National Public Radio in November 2004.

Throughout its 126-year history, the **UMS Choral Union** has performed with many of the world's distinguished orchestras and conductors.

Based in Ann Arbor under the aegis of UMS, the 175-voice Choral Union is known for its definitive performances of large-scale works for chorus and orchestra. Thirteen years ago, the Choral Union further enriched that tradition when it began appearing regularly with the Detroit Symphony Orchestra (DSO).

Led by recently appointed Conductor and Music Director Jerry Blackstone, the 05/06 season included collaborations with the DSO, a concert performance of Rossini's opera *Tancredi*, Shostakovich's *Symphony No. 2* with the Kirov Orchestra of the Mariinsky Theatre, and Vaughan Williams's *Sea Symphony* with the U-M School of Music's Symphony Orchestra conducted by Jerry Blackstone.

Participation in the UMS Choral Union remains

open to all students and adults by audition. For more information about the UMS Choral Union, please e-mail choralunion@umich.edu.

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The Chancel Choir of the First Presbyterian Church of Ann Arbor has a long and rich history of fine choral singing. For 50 years the church has been known for its classical choral tradition in worship and regular performances of major works with orchestra. The works of Brahms, Mozart, Bach, Britten, Fauré, Handel, Haydn, Mendelssohn, and most recently, Mozart's C minor Mass, have drawn residents of Ann Arbor to the nave of this historic church. In December 2002, the choir invited jazz legend Dave Brubeck to the church to perform two sold-out performances of his Christmas cantata, La Fiesta de la Posada, with orchestra and jazz trio, including two of his sons, Chris and Daniel Brubeck. In 2005, Mr. Brubeck returned to the First Presbyterian Church to perform his Pentecost oratorio Voice of the Holy Spirit, with the Dave Brubeck Quartet, Chancel Choir, and orchestra. Led by Music Director Susan Boggs, the Chancel Choir has made two international choir tours: Poland, Hungary, and the Czech Republic in 2000; and to Russia, Ukraine, and Estonia in 2004.

### **UMS** Archives

ne of the most-revered icons of jazz, Dave Brubeck, at the age of 85 years, is still composing, recording, touring, and performing. Dave Brubeck has a deep performance history in both Ann Arbor and at Hill Auditorium. Mr. Brubeck made his UMS debut on January 17, 1974 at Hill Auditorium with "Two Generations of Brubeck," a concert that featured his sons Darius, Chris, and Dan along with the Detroit Symphony Orchestra and the UMS Choral Union. The program featured selections by Dave Brubeck and Sons as well as excerpts from his landmark 1968 oratorio, *The Light in the Wilderness*, also featured on this evening's concert tribute program.

This was certainly not Dave Brubeck's Ann Arbor debut. In 1954, the original Dave Brubeck Quartet, including Paul Desmond, Bob Bates, and Joe Dodge, recorded a legendary concert at Hill Auditorium that was later compiled into a collection of campus concerts by Columbia Records and released as *Jazz Goes to College*.

The Dave Brubeck Quartet returned to Ann Arbor under UMS auspices on February 5, 1986 performing live music to choreography by the Murray Louis Dance Company including "Glances" and "Four Brubeck Pieces" at the Power Center. Outside of UMS presentations, the Ann Arbor Summer Festival and the First Presbyterian Church of Ann Arbor—who recently presented an evening-length concert of Mr. Brubeck's *The Voice of the Holy Spirit*—have each contributed to Mr. Brubeck's Ann Arbor allure with presentations of their own.

The current Dave Brubeck Quartet made its most recent UMS appearance at Hill Auditorium on October 2, 2004.

In one evening, UMS pays tribute to and presents the artist with the UMS Distinguished Artist Award and hosts a dinner in the artist's honor. The 2006 Ford Honors Program celebrates the 11th anniversary of the UMS Distinguished Artist Award. Previous awardees are Van Cliburn (1996), Jessye Norman (1997), Garrick Ohlsson (1998), Canadian Brass (1999), Isaac Stern (2000), Marcel Marceau (2001), Marilyn Horne (2002), Christopher Parkening (2003), Sweet Honey In The Rock (2004), and the Guarneri String Quartet (2005). Ford Motor Company's leadership grant to UMS, along with the additional support UMS receives from individuals and organizations participating in this evening's event, provides significant support to UMS's nationally recognized Education Program.

Kenneth C. Fischer is the President of the University Musical Society (UMS) of the University of Michigan, a position he has held since 1987. He has contributed to the performing arts presenting field as a speaker, workshop leader, writer, consultant, panelist, and

cultural ambassador under US State Department auspices to Brazil, China, Lithuania, and Mexico. He currently serves on the boards of directors of Association of Performing Arts Presenters, Interlochen Center for the Arts, Arts Midwest, and Art-Serve Michigan. He is also active with the Major University Presenters Network, Classical Action/ Performing Arts Against AIDS, Chamber Music America, and International Society for the Performing Arts from whom he received the Patrick Hayes Award in 2003 for his career achievements. Before joining UMS, Mr. Fischer was a management consultant, independent concert presenter, and association executive in Washington, DC. He is active with Ann Arbor Rotary and volunteers with several local non-profit organizations. Mr. Fischer grew up in nearby Plymouth, attended the Interlochen Arts Camp, and has degrees from The College of Wooster in Ohio and the University of Michigan. He is married to flutist Penelope Peterson Fischer, and they have one son, Matthew, who is married and lives in San Francisco.

**Timothy J. O'Brien**, Deputy Chief of Staff, is responsible for Executive Operations (Chairman's Office, Air Transportation Office, Corporate Security & Fire, Global Brand Entertainment and Corporate Alliances & Executive Services), as well as the Sustainable Business Strategies Office. Most recently, Mr. O'Brien has led the Company to publish the industry's first Sustainability Report and first Climate Change Report.

Named to this position in January 2006, Mr. O'Brien also continues to be responsible for leading the redevelopment of the Ford Rouge Center in Dearborn as well as for the Ford Rouge Factory Tour. The Ford Rouge Center transformation was a \$2 billion, five-year program which re-established the Rouge as a model of lean and flexible manufacturing, as well as a 21st-century model of sustainable manufacturing. Environmental highlights at the Rouge include the world's largest green roof (10.5 acres) a site-wide natural storm water management system of natural landscape greenspace, swales, wetlands, and porous paving, phytoremediation of contaminated soils, and a fumes to fuel energy system. These and other sustainable features at the Rouge have saved the Company tens of millions of dollars, restored wildlife habitat, and have been recognized by numerous architectural, business, and environmental awards.

Mr. O'Brien joined Ford in August 1973 and



held positions with the Office of the General Counsel from 1977 through 1993. Here, he had a series of positions, including tax attorney and environmental matters senior attorney, during which time he was the auto industry's lead legal representative on mobile source

environmental issues. In 1993, Mr. O'Brien joined Ford's Environmental and Safety Engineering Office and became Director of Ford's Environmental Quality Office in 1996. As Director of the Environmental Quality Office, Mr. O'Brien led Ford to become the first auto company to certify all of its global manufacturing operations to the ISO 140001 environmental management system standard and implemented a global water conservation program which has reduced water consumption by over five billion gallons per year and reduced operating costs by more than \$10 million per year.

Mr. O'Brien has also served as Ford Vice President, Real Estate, which he was named in November 2001, and Ford Vice President, Corporate Relations, which he was named in December, 2002.

Mr. O'Brien earned a bachelor's degree in polit-

ical science from the University of Michigan and a doctorate from the Detroit College of Law at Michigan State University. He is the author of *Clean Air Law and Regulation, Title II Motor Vehicle Provisions* (Bureau of National Affairs, 1992), and *Ford & ISO 14001* (McGraw Hill, 2001). He has lectured on business implementation of sustainability at Cambridge University, Harvard University, the University of Michigan, and at numerous other academic and business forums.


Mr. O'Brien is active in many community organizations and is a member of the boards of directors of the Heinz Center, Detroit Renaissance, The Henry Ford Academy, GreenWays Initiative, Oakwood Healthcare, Inc., HRH Prince of Wales Business & The Environment Program, Dearborn Country Club, and the China–US Center for Sustainable Development. He is working chairman of the Southeast Michigan Water Quality Consortium and a member of the board of trustees for the Ford Motor Company Fund, and the Company's Executive Champion for the University of Michigan, the University of Michigan-Dearborn, and Notre Dame University.

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**Mary Sue Coleman** has led the University of Michigan since being appointed its 13th president in August 2002.

As president, she has unveiled several major initiatives that will have an impact on future generations of students, the intellectual life of the campus, and society at large. These include campus initiatives that will examine student residential life, the interdisciplinary richness of the U-M, ethics in our society, and issues related to health care.

Under her leadership, the University has launched "The Michigan Difference," an ambitious capital campaign for the future of the institution. With a goal of \$2.5 billion, this campaign will

to search the text of the University's seven million volume library and will open the way to universal access and the preservation of recorded human knowledge.

In defending admissions policies as the University prevailed at the US Supreme Court in 2003, President Coleman has become a national spokesperson on the educational value of affirmative action and diverse perspectives in the classroom.

Her extensive leadership positions in higher education include serving on the Association of American Universities Executive Committee, the Internet2 Board of Directors, the National Collegiate Athletic Association Board of Directors, and the Knight Commission on Intercollegiate Athletics.

Elected to the Institute of Medicine in 1997, President Coleman also is a Fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science and of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences. She co-chaired a major policy study of the Institute of Medicine, examining the consequences of uninsurance, and has become a nationally recognized expert on the issue.

As a biochemist, Dr. Coleman built a distinguished research career through her research on the immune system and malignancies. She authored numerous articles on her findings and directed funded research projects supported by a variety of federal agencies. At the University, she holds the appointments of professor of biological chemistry in the Medical School and professor of chemistry in the College of Literature, Science, and the Arts.

For 19 years she was a member of the biochemistry faculty at the University of Kentucky. Her work in the sciences led her to administrative appointments at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and the University of New Mexico, where she served as provost and vice president for academic affairs. From 1995–2002, Dr. Coleman was president of the University of Iowa.

President Coleman is a trustee of the John S. and James L. Knight Foundation and the Gerald R. Ford Foundation. She serves on the boards of directors of Johnson & Johnson and the Meredith Corporation.

She earned her undergraduate degree in chemistry from Grinnell College and her doctorate in biochemistry from the University of North Carolina. She holds honorary doctorates from Grinnell College, Luther College, the University of Kentucky, Albion College, Dartmouth College, and Shanghai Jiao Tong University, and a distinguished alumnus award from the University of North Carolina.

President Coleman and her husband, Dr. Kenneth Coleman, a political scientist specializing in Latin America, live in the historic President's House on the University campus. Their son, Jonathan, is a portfolio manager in Denver, CO.

### UMS EDUCATION AND AUDIENCE DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

Triving to provide world-class educational events and cultural exchange to the broadest definition of the community, the UMS Education and Audience Development Program continued its progressive growth and mission in many areas. Through a wide variety of partnership and collaborations with individuals and community organizations, UMS was able to expand its commitment to audiences through a wide variety of activities designed for different ages, nationalities, and learning styles. We recognize that every single person has a unique relationship to the arts, and our role is to enhance that connection through dialogue and participation. UMS Education has been awarded the "Best Practice" award by both ArtServe Michigan and the Dana Foundation. In the past season, UMS was able to offer 89 events to nearly 24,500 people as part of our Education and Audience Development program.

### YOUTH, TEEN AND FAMILY EDUCATION

The largest Youth Performance program in Michigan, UMS's Youth Education Program is uniquely developed in partnership with the Ann Arbor Public Schools (AAPS) and the Washtenaw Intermediate School District (WISD). UMS provides world-class artistic experiences and professional development to students, young adults, teachers, and families. UMS has been in partnership with the AAPS and WISD since 1997 as part of the Kennedy Center Partners in Education program. Nearly 40 events serving over 17,000 people were planned in the 05/06 season.

### K-12 Youth Performance Series

UMS's acclaimed one-hour, specially designed, in-theater performances for students offered 11 performances this season of six different artists. This quantity allowed nearly 15,000 students to attend this series. Over 100 schools from 25 districts participated in UMS's Youth Performance Series. This season alone, over 6,000 students were able to see special daytime performances of Children of Uganda, with 50% of all attending students coming from outside of Ann Arbor.

### **UMS Teacher Workshop Series**

Along with parents, UMS believes that teachers are instrumental in the development of the arts in our children. UMS is part of the Kennedy Center Partners in Education Program, offering world-class Kennedy Center workshop leaders, as well as workshops designed by local arts experts, to our community. With 10 diverse workshops this past season, nearly 320 teachers attended UMS's teacher workshop series this season. From book clubs to spoken-word workshops, to day-long participatory immersions on African culture, UMS provided a year's worth of professional development for teachers to immediately utilize in their classroom.

### **UMS Curriculum Packets**

UMS creates teacher curriculum packets, CDs, and DVDs for all of the schools participating in UMS's diverse program. These guides have garnered national attention and are used throughout the performing arts industry. The guides are recognized as essential tools for enhancing the classroom experience.

### UMS K-12 School Enrichment

UMS has expanded its effort in in-school enhancement by providing additional support to the classroom teacher with trained arts professionals to more effectively teach students. Over the course of the season, UMS has facilitated over 11 of these classroom visits, affecting nearly 500 students.

This two-day event offered free and low-cost family-friendly cultural events to members of the Ann Arbor area community in multiple venues throughout the city.



school music departments have received a total of nine Grammy Signature School awards, including the coveted Grammy "Gold" status for each building. This year, Pioneer High

School received the top honor, being named the "2006 National Grammy Signature School." This year, Ann Arbor was recognized by the American Music Conference as being one of the "Top 100 Communities for Music Education" in the country.

Advocating passionately for arts education, Ms. Berg is in demand across the state for her presentations on the importance of arts education in the lives of all students. Known for her proactive approach, collaborative skills, high expectations, and incredible vision, Ms. Berg has navigated the treacherous shrinking budget waters to expand the AAPS Fine Arts Department at a time when many other districts find these programs in jeopardy.

### ADULT AND Community Education

UMS serves its adult and university populations in many different ways. Providing relevance and context to our audiences is of crucial importance and aids in allowing audiences to become fully engaged in their experience. UMS emphasizes the importance of partnering with community organizations in the development of these programs. Throughout the past season, UMS partnered with over 175 individuals, community organizations, and university units to plan over 50 events. Nearly all events were free and open to the public.

### **Artist Residencies**

The artists hold a special place at UMS, and last season was no exception. UMS encourages artists and ensembles to be actively engaged in the community. UMS facilitated and managed major residency activities with artists and ensembles throughout the year, including Marc Bamuthi Joseph, Louis Andriessen, Pappa Tarahumara, the Handspring and Sogolon Puppet Companies, and the Piccolo Teatro di Milano.

### **Adult and Community Education**

UMS continued to provide a broad range of educational events that appeals to the widest variety of community members. UMS held seven master classes, four public interviews, six classroom visits, seven lectures, one panel discussion, one roundtable discussion, one symposium, two study clubs, and 23 other events including exhibits, films, and receptions. Nearly 7,500 people participated in UMS's educational exchanges.

### The NETWORK: African American Arts Advocacy Committee

The NETWORK was a new initiative launched by UMS during the past two seasons to create an opportunity for African Americans and broader communities to celebrate the world-class artistry of today's leading African and African-American performers and creative artists. Over 1,100 NETWORK members connected, socialized, and networked with the African-American community through attendance at UMS events and free pre-concert receptions.

### Partnership and Collaboration



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
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
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
